Sixty to seventy people braved the rain to get an impressive practical insight into the brave new world of micro-electronics, courtesy of Makerspace and **Tim Elliot**, on November 5th. Here, villagers have a close look at how a 3D printer works:

Waldringfield Church Field Trust

Visitors to the field may have noticed the new all - weather information board which now stands near the entrance at the lower end by the car park. This was financed by Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB Community and Conservation Fund. The board was made with the help of designer Chris Saunders and Ipswich firm Signs for You. It gives information about the field and different wildlife you may see there.



Plenty of people have been out making use of the field over the last few months and the wildlife group enjoyed their summer picnic there. There seem to always be skylarks singing - even now in November - and the kestrel is often about.

Unfortunately, a large amount of firework debris appeared following the 11th November including bits of fireworks, rockets and sticks scattered over the games area, plus an enormous dumped box of commercial firework remains. Anyone with information about where this came from is asked to get in touch. We are concerned that no permission was requested and trustees had to clear up the mess.

The AGM is planned for November 30th at 7.30 in the Kennedy Room with mince pies and mulled wine. This should have happened when you read this! Anyone wishing to help with occasional work on the field is invited to get in touch. There will be a work party (weather permitting) on 2nd February when a number of volunteers who regularly help out within the Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB will be coming to our village to help with some tasks at Church Field and also other spots in the village. More details will be published on waldringfielders and on the noticeboards at the field, nearer the time.

Suffolk County Council

For the coming year, dare I say years, politics, both national and local, will be a challenge. All will be aware of the difficulties we are facing in trying to trim budgets and make efficiency savings that will have the least impact on services.

Inevitably services will change. Technology has altered the landscape and enabled some areas to become more efficient, but, less personal.

Suffolk County Council is determined to maintain the level of our two most vital services, Adult Social Care and Children's Services; areas that involve the most vulnerable in society. Other services will be altered and savings made.

However, there is a glimmer of light. I believe that we need to become a more responsible society. Society can learn from communities such as this, that do so much good and help themselves, for that will be the future.

As your County Councillor, I attend all parish meetings and give a monthly report that contains information about SCC and my activities. I chair the Police and Crime Panel whose remit is to both challenge and support the Police & Crime Commissioner. Over the past 3 years I have built up a relationship with Tim Passmore and our informal meetings are frank, robust and good-humoured.

I have recently been appointed to the Health Scrutiny Committee and, as we are all well aware, the Health Service needs a huge injection of funding. However, like many other organisations, they are looking at partnerships to reduce overlap and gain more efficiency.

Suffolk Coastal District Council

BROWN BINS

Suffolk Coastal does not want to charge for brown bins. This is a complicated issue but we are in the top 10% when it comes to recycling so we have a very good record which we do not want to lose. Suffolk County have had to reduce their subsidy, which has a knock-on affect on the Districts. SCDC is trying to absorb this extra cost and at present is not expecting to charge.

PLANNING

The preferred Options document was out for consultation, closing on Friday 30th November. Decisions made after consultation will govern how we accommodate our contribution towards housing in our district.

FELIXSTOWE PORT HEALTH

I visited this new facility. I think we should be reassured that products coming in through Felixstowe go through very thorough testing. On going through a radioactive sensor in a minibus during our tour of the port, this was sensitive enough to pick up radioactivity in a Councillor who had had treatment 4 weeks ago. Figs were being tested whilst I was there. A whole container was unloaded manually, several samples from random boxes were removed for testing elsewhere. The container was then repacked. There are currently 30 trains going in to the port and 30 trains leaving every day.

DEVOLUTION

This is still rumbling along awaiting results of meetings in late November. Providing that all parties can work effectively together this might be achievable.

There are those who work in various ways, practically and monetarily, to ensure upkeep, but the church and its grounds are there for all to visit, for whatever reason, and to offer a quiet personal space.

Benefice Re-organisation appears to have stalled due to the fact that no response has been received to the advertisement for a rector for the proposed benefice parishes. We understand that re-advertising is to take place.

The Reverend Christine Nunn continues to serve this parish. Chris has unstintingly offered support to the various families in the village who have suffered bereavement this year, and continues to do so. We are greatly indebted to her and her generosity of spirit.

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust annual cycle ride took place on September 13th, supported by its stalwarts, both in cycling and sponsorship. We have currently received our share of £642 and usually a little more filters through. Thanks to all participants and sponsors, and to Frances Matheson for organising at a local level.

Remembrance Service. By publication time, we will have held our Remembrance Service, including acknowledgement of those from Waldringfield who lost their lives. Those are inscribed on a large plaque in the church, and a new wreath of poppies will be placed. Following our recent pattern, the collection will be donated to the Woodbridge branch of the Royal British Legion.

Churchyard Maintenance continues to be a hefty task. The time had come to invest in a new motor mower and the PCC was fortunate that the small Woodbridge company, Gilman-Earle Design, obtained a new top brand machine from its suppliers at cost only to us.



Save our hedgehogs!



Hedgehogs, although scarcer than formerly, have been seen in the village this year on at least three occasions. It is very important to keep an eye open for them when strimming, clearing leaves and making any bonfires. Leaves are best rotted down to make leaf mould, of course. If you are lighting an autumn bonfire remember to build a new fire from your collection of wood and not set fire to piles which have been sitting there for some time and may be harbouring hedgehogs or other wildlife.

Waldringfield Wildlife Group supports the Suffolk Wildlife Trust hedgehog project. Lots of information about hedgehogs and how to help them is also to be found at www.hedgehogstreet.org and, on the RSPB website, there are instructions on how to build a hedgehog house for hibernation. They are declining at the same rate as tigers - 5% per year for reasons not yet clear. In autumn, slugs form a large part of their diet. However, they can be helped by feeding mealworms or cat or dog food - not milk which upsets their digestion, or bread which is a poor protein source.

Brighter verges

Waldringfield Wildlife Group have again been planting bulbs in the verges to extend the pollen and nectar provision for bees, moths and butterflies and brighten things up!

The Squirrels class from Waldringfield School were out on a sunny afternoon in November planting 1000 wild daffodils



on the inside edges of the playing field and a good time was had by all. Other bulbs put in by the Wildlife Group include species delphiniums, alliums, fritillaries and grape hyacinth in different verges around the village.

Funding for the bulbs was provided by the Parish Council and by private donations.

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Give, receive and recycle this Christmas

With every Suffolk resident expected to throw away around 50 kilos of waste this Christmas, the Suffolk Waste Partnership is asking people to remember to recycle rather than giving to landfill.

This is the time of year when we produce the most amount of waste. Every January, Suffolk recycles an extra 600 tonnes of waste (equivalent to an extra 96,000 recycling bins) and sends an extra 1,250 tonnes to landfill (equivalent to 79,000 rubbish bins).

There will be hundreds of thousands of cards, electrical items, CDs, DVDs, cartons, glass bottles and textiles waiting to be recycled, not to mention all that leftover packaging and food.



Help at hand to make room for your new Christmas jumpers

With Christmas jumpers flying off the shelves this year, help is also available to make room in the wardrobe. In addition to giving unwanted clothes to charity, all Suffolk residents can now bag up their unwanted textiles, tie them securely and pop the bag inside their recycling bin.

If you need more textiles bags, please email textiles@suffolk.gov.uk, call **0345 603 9412** or collect them in person from any council office or library.

Councillor Andrew Nunn, chair of the Suffolk Waste Partnership, said "We are all so busy having fun at Christmas and can generate a lot more waste. A lot of this extra waste can be saved from landfill which is why it's important to make full use of your recycling bin."

"We hope people won't forget to recycle things like textiles too. It's easy to get hold of our special bags - just email, call us or collect a bag from any council office or library."

Household Waste Recycling Centres

The Household Waste Recycling Centres provide a great service for residents over the Christmas period and only close on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. They will be open and ready to take excess Christmas recycling from the 27 to 31 December.

Swifts in and around Woodbridge – RSPB Woodbridge Group Swift Survey 2015

A lot of people will share our feelings about swifts. The screams and shrieks of swifts as they turn and swirl in the evening sky are a precious part of summer. We want this to be more than just a nostalgic memory, as swifts are declining in numbers.

This summer in Woodbridge I heard some bad news, swifts had been vainly trying to find nest sites in a restored building by the harbour. It appears that the spaces under the eaves where they had nested had been blocked. I also heard some good news, SCDC had recommended swift nest boxes for the building on Whisstocks site by the harbour and the developers had agreed.



We felt we needed to do something. So, this summer we started our project with a survey asking for information about swifts. Thirty five observers in the Woodbridge, and the surrounding area responded. We now know about, at least 10 nesting sites, some in roofs and some in boxes.

Waldringfield should be a good place for swifts. They were observed flying in small groups over the village on a number of occasions through the summer. The supply of flying insects over the salt marsh and low lying ground should attract them. There should be nesting sites in the eaves and roof spaces of the older houses. We understand that a couple of houses in School Road have installed nest boxes.

We would like our project to move forward now in three ways. We need to work closely with home owners, builders and developers to remind them that swifts need access to roof spaces for nesting. Swifts are clean and non-intrusive guests. We also need to publicise nest boxes. They are a possible alternative. They can be 'swift bricks', built into the wall under the eaves during building work, or traditional nest boxes. They work best with a CD of swift calls. Finally we should work with SCDC to encourage planners to make provision for swifts. Many local authorities have such a policy.

YOUNG FAMILY ENJOYING THE SIGHTS AND SOUNDS OF THE DEBEN

Suffolk Association of Local Councils has a long-standing policy position that town and parish councils should have a right of appeal against planning decisions to mirror the right of developers. SALC presented this policy to the National Association of Local Councils and it was adopted, but pressure is growing from other quarters. The latest instance is a resident in Staffordshire who has initiated an online petition. If you are interested in signing the petition, please note the details below. With sufficient signatures, a parliamentary debate is triggered.

I've started a petition to ask the government to give parish councils the right to appeal planning decisions. Parish Councils will usually have a detailed understanding of an area and local needs. Most parish councils can be trusted to act in the best interests of their constituents and are usually run by responsible individuals who would be loath to bring frivolous appeals. However, in an era where more and more development is planned, a limited right of third party appeal would ensure that particularly contentious decisions can be reviewed by the Planning Inspectorate, and using the existing parish council infrastructure minimises legislative and operational cost and impact.

If you agree, please sign the petition at this link: <https://petition.parliament.uk/petitions/110489> If we get 10,000 signatures, the government must publish an official response to the proposal. At 100,000 signatures, the proposal gets debated in Parliament.
