

Waldringfield Defibrillator (AED) now installed and linked to the Emergency Services

A community project, the installation of an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED), has now been completed and fully inter-linked with the East of England Ambulance Services.

This was in response to the tragic event earlier this year, when a sailor suffered a heart attack on the river and died, despite receiving the emergency first aid assistance that was available. The nearest Defibrillator had to come from Martlesham.

The Parish Council led the project and was generously supported in its efforts by the Sailing Club, the Village Hall Trust, the Maybush Inn and the Fairways Committee. Private donations were received and the electrical installation was made by Cllr Colin Archer at no charge.

The Parish Council wishes to record its thanks to all involved.

The device has been installed on the rear wall of the Maybush Inn and is easy to operate. In the event of an emergency, 999 or 112 should be dialled first and the Ambulance Service (if appropriate) will provide the key code to the cabinet. The equipment can then be removed and the user is guided through the process by an integral video display.

The procedure requires no previous medical experience or training and is designed specifically to be used by anyone in (almost) any circumstances. An awareness session is being planned (see Page 4).

(At the moment, this is to replace the sleepers bounding the vegetable patch in the school, which have started to rot away.) If you have any printer ink cartridges which you are able to donate, please drop them off at the school office or pop them through the letter box if the school is closed. Please note that we can not recycle photocopier toner cartridges, Kodak or Epson Cartridges.

As always, the school really benefits from the support shown to it by the members of the community, and the funds we raise at the events held throughout the year make a significant difference to the learning experience of the children at Waldringfield. This year, in addition to supporting the school with grants towards maintenance and supporting travel for outings, we have been able to fund the erection of an outdoor classroom, have granted funds to the Eco-team so that they can apply for "Green Flag" status, and have funded the whole school visit to the Rock 'n Roll Panto.



The Community HeartBeat Trust

With the increasing availability in communities of defibrillators, the challenge for any local response group is how to be contacted in the least possible time. Out of hospital Cardiac Arrest tends to happen in the home in some 67% of SCA (London Ambulance Service data) and in these cases it is highly likely that there is only one person with the casualty. To get help quickly and to get another member of the community to come and help with CPR, or to fetch the community defibrillator, is therefore a challenge.

Where formal Community First Responder schemes exist, the ambulance service will contact them after a 999 call. But what about areas where no CFR exist, and the community is reliant on its own helpers, or do not wish formal CFR schemes?

Villages like Carlton (Leicestershire) has six volunteers willing to respond in the event of a Cardiac Arrest in the village. In addition to the village residents, each volunteer helper has been further trained in how to recognise a Cardiac Arrest, and how to undertake CPR and administer the defibrillator. Other villages have similar schemes. When there is an emergency in the village 999 is always called, followed by the village emergency number which rings simultaneously every one of the phones. The first volunteer to answer takes the call and all other phones stop ringing.



The first volunteer can take any details and rush to the patient and commence CPR or can go to collect the defibrillator, or just to be available to assist as required. This saves precious time and a second volunteer on hand to assist. The local ambulance service can also be given the VETS number and in some circumstances may call for additional assistance (dependent on agreement with the local ambulance service)

The Community Heartbeat Trust now provides a service to help villages install and run a Village Emergency Telephone System, or VETS. This is provided at cost on an annual basis to the village, and uses a simple memorable number unique for the village. The system can also be used for any emergency where additional help is required from neighbours.

The availability of VETS helps villages whether or not they are using a CHT provided project, and gives a level of reassurance to the elderly, those living alone, and to the infirmed, that there is always help on hand.

Parking around Waldringfield Primary School

In common with almost all schools, Waldringfield Primary faces parking issues when parents deliver and collect their children at each end of the school day. This is a particular problem, given that many children live outside the village and the car is the only feasible means of transport for almost all.

To try to alleviate the inevitable, if short-lived congestion, and, more importantly, to reduce the risk to all children who use the approach roads to the School, a 'walking bus' is being introduced as an experiment, with parking at the Baptist Church in Waldringfield Heath.

However, this (of its own) will only provide one solution and the Headteacher, Sarah Wood, is very much aware of the problem and will work with any interested resident if they can think of any other solution.

To those few, please pick up what your dog leaves behind, bag it and bin it in the many receptacles around the village.


Failing that, please take the bag home and find somewhere much more suitable to dispose of it, rather than let the contents find their way onto other people's shoes, possessions or clothing.
