You can see from the pictures that we did a massive clear up of redundant tree guards as well – the pink ones are from the bluebell wood up near the café at Sheepdrift Corner (and watch for a more forgiving mowing regime on that verge following a good conversation with the café owner) and the smaller ones (there are lots packed inside each other) are from the field to the south west of the Heath Crossroads. We were given permission by the owner of Rattlerow Farms to do this – and he even supplied us with four litter pickers. There’s still a lot of guards to remove – feel free to start a new pile! Waldringfield Parish Council

For over a year, Waldringfield Parish Council has been conducting its meetings remotely, by Zoom. However, after 6th May Government regulations have prevented us from conducting our meetings in this way. All future meetings will be held in the Village Hall, with all the appropriate social distancing and other precautions. We are allowed to have 'hybrid' meetings, though, which means that although there will be a face-to-face meeting, people can attend remotely if they feel more comfortable with that, or if they can't attend physically.

Details of both the physical meeting and a link to the Zoom remote meeting will be given in the normal notice, i.e. on Waldringfielders and the Parish Council noticeboards (please note: they won't necessarily be on the usual second Tuesday in the month, depending on availability of the Village Hall). The meetings are open to everyone, all are welcome, whether you wish to contribute or not.

Waldringfield Parish Council is seeking to recruit a Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer (RFO).

Part-time permanent post

Average hours 46 per month (working remotely and attendance at monthly Parish Council meetings)

Full time equivalent initial salary £19,698–£20,493, depending on experience.

The Clerk plays a vital management role in the council and has the legal status of the Proper Officer of the Council. In addition to ensuring that the council acts within its legal powers, the combined role of Clerk/RFO has a broad range of responsibilities including: setting meeting agendas, recording minutes, data protection compliance, dealing with correspondence, preparing annual financial statements, budget preparation and monitoring, keeping financial records and reconciliation. Also, uploading information on to the Council's website and organising the council's day-to-day administration.

The successful candidate will be able to show they have good interpersonal, organisational, communication, IT and numeracy skills. An understanding of basic accounting would be desirable but not essential. Previous experience as a Clerk/RFO is not necessary as you will be offered lots of support and the Parish Council will fund appropriate training as required.

The role can be occasionally challenging and always stimulating and rewarding. It offers the opportunity to play an important part within our friendly, energetic and active community.

A Tree Warden Writes

Last Autumn, tree wardens around Suffolk collected a lot of seeds of different trees and started them off to grow new trees and hedges for the future. In Waldringfield, several of us have been tending our collections and some have got very good germination while some species are still biding their time under the soil. It looks as though we will have a lot of Alder, Hawthorn, Field Maple and other hedging plants but it is early days yet in tree terms and there should be more as the season progresses.

The recent rain has helped the new hedges planted in winter, which were suffering a bit with the drought, and at present things are growing pretty well. Anyone who would like a hedge of native species planted – especially by a field or on the edge of the village where it is next to agricultural land – is invited to get in touch. I expect to be able to source mixed hedging and trees from the Tree Council as in earlier years. I also have a collection of trees in pots including some suitable for gardens, so do get in touch for free trees if you are interested.

Hedges provide a refuge for wildlife, foraging for insects, food for birds and bats, shelter for hedgehogs and links for them all to move between safe spots as they try to carry on their lives in the dangerous world they inhabit.


By the end of May I will be taking part in the 'No Mow May' project of counting the flowers in a metre square of unmown grass. This project is run by Plantlife as a nationwide survey of lawns and other maintained grassy spaces. It should help pollinators which need the flowers to survive – bees and many other insects. Anyone can do this at Church Field, in the playing field and in our own gardens. While counting flowers, watch out for butterflies, as the Big Butterfly Count will be coming along next!

Waldringfield Swift Update

Swifts have arrived over Waldringfield. The first reported sighting was by John Ogden on 6th May circling over Greenaway; the next day John saw a pair swooping low in front of where one of the known nest sites exists in lower Waldringfield. On the same day, swifts were seen over Deben Lane and The Quay and there are now consistent sightings over School Lane. On 9th May a swift was seen going into its usual nesting spot in Deben Lane and 15 swifts were seen over Fishpond Road.

This year, Waldringfield residents were ready to help these threatened birds by providing 'bed and breakfast', giving them the home and food they need. When arriving back in the UK in Spring, after a marathon journey from their wintering grounds in Africa, they need two things: a safe place to nest and plenty of invertebrates to eat. But these two things are sadly increasingly difficult to find. Without the food and nest sites they need to successfully raise chicks, swifts are likely to keep declining. So, over the past few months, Waldringfield residents, the Primary School and the Village Hall put up 45 swift boxes and made their gardens more wildlife-friendly to encourage more of the insects that swifts depend on. They are unlike many of the other birds we help by putting up bird feeders which encourage them to flock in, as swifts feed high up on the wing.

We now have swift boxes in the following locations: The Quay, Cliff Road, Deben Lane, School Lane, School Road, Fishpond Road and Woodbridge Road. Two more are to go up in Sandy Lane. Most of the swift box owners are playing the swift call sound to help the swifts locate the potential nest sites.

Swift boxes are not easy to install as they need to be at a height of about 5 metres, so there are significant health and safety issues. We needed skilled tradespeople to help us. Fortunately, Lewis Culf and his team heard our plea and stepped up to help protect our swifts by installing the boxes over two separate days, including over May Bank Holiday. Many thanks to Lewis and his team.

Waldringfield Village Hall Trust Lottery

What an unusual year for the Lottery it has been. With the loss of the Coffee Mornings because of the pandemic regulations – therefore no forum to have a live draw – we have had to resort to a monthly virtual draw. Many thanks to all the people who have volunteered to help achieve this. Congratulations to all the monthly winners and, of course, commiseration to those who have never had a win – I can only say better luck in the future! Only the June draw is left to go in the current Lottery year, with the new year beginning on 1st July.



This Lottery provides a useful contribution to the finances of your Village Hall and it is well worth the effort to expand and keeping it going. For the benefit of new residents in the village, I should simply explain that there is a monthly draw for five prizes currently valued at:

First Prize	£46
Second Prize	£36
Third Prize	£25
Fourth Prize	£14
Fifth Prize	£10

There is a complicated formula for working out the prize values but importantly, in round figures, there is a 50/50% split of the total monthly value of the number of £1.00 tickets sold between the Hall and prizes. Players can have as many numbers as they wish.

Collectors will be knocking on doors during May/June to extract £12 for each number you may have (12 x £1 monthly draws), so please be ready ! There will also be a letter to each house giving full details of how to take part. In the meantime, here are the ways to make payment:

Please mark the envelope 'Lottery' and make sure your name and address appear somewhere! If you are able to help in this way, it will also save the collectors from making unwanted visits! So, look out for my letter...if you haven't already got it! If you have any questions, please do contact me.

The unique 'Yachtman's Service' will be held on the beach on


Sunday 27th June at 6pm
