

Update on Brightwell Lakes May 2023

As we can see the work at the entrances and on-site continues.

The A12 roadworks and the main entrance onto the site are taking shape. Taylor Wimpey are in discussions with the District Council (ESC) regarding retaining the existing 4 metre high bund which runs along the A12 to create a more natural boundary.

We are expecting revised plans for the main areas of the SANGS, open green space including the lake, to be presented shortly. Taylor Wimpey believe that they have enhanced the original application including the areas of play-space.

Names have been agreed for 15 roads in the western section of the development, including the main spine road. The names for this section are all associated with the site's previous links to science, technology and flying. The spine road will be named after Auster (a type of aircraft). Others include Paterson, Babbage, Faraday etc. Roads in the central and eastern section of the development will reflect the original nature of the "lost" heathland and the lake.

It is anticipated that houses on the first parcels of land, referred to as E1 & W1, will start to be occupied from the summer of 2024. The total of 317 to be delivered by 2028.

Planning applications for the next three parcels of land, referred to as W2, 5 & 6 to the west of the site are expected in the first half of 2024. These applications will be for a total of 390 dwellings which would be delivered by 2032.

The current estimated completion date for the whole site has been pushed back to 2044.

At the moment there is no firm decision regarding the school. Suffolk County Council is the body who will decide on whether it will be an all-through school or how it will be broken down. They are currently in discussions with potential Academies. Taylor Wimpey are negotiating with SCC to hand over the land for the school when 350 dwellings are occupied. Sports pitches will be made available when 600 dwellings are occupied.

The current plans for the allotments in the south western section of the site include dividing each allotment plot into 2 or 3 raised beds plus communal sheds & possibly greenhouses. The area allocated to allotments on the eastern boundary will include a community orchard.

We are promoting **NO MOW MAY** – hold your nerve and rest the mower – the flowers will come. As will the heat and longer grass shields the ground from scorching. Also if you cut back the sward the roots prune themselves to keep in proportion: grass with shallower roots recovers less quickly. We hope some with longer grass will do a couple of flowering plants counts – for guidance see the PlantLife website. Similar to the Big Garden Bird Watch but for plants! But that is for next time too!

Our June event is a visit to **Kentwell Hall** – contact Jacky Waghorn if you want to go – shared lifts if we can.

And of course, we hope lots of people are preparing for the **Flower, Produce and Craft Show** on 12th August. With all the water stored in the ground after this wet spring perhaps we will have crops worth showing this year!

All events in March and April were sparsely attended – the Invasive Species Attack on Allium Triquetrum yielded a generous barrowful however, and it is good to know that some Hemley residents have done a stalwart job on keeping the Alexanders at bay both in Newbourne and where Mill Road swings right at Church Farm – there are native bluebells established on that bank, in danger of being swamped. The propagating workshop on March 11th was too early – too little growth but a small group has some fun sharing. The Composting Workshop on 25th was also a minority taste. But we will continue to offer events and happenings and hope for greater uptake at some point! Especially if you tell us what you would like!



Finally, if you want an allotment – we don't have them in Waldringfield but WG was set up with the express aim of getting them – please contact the Parish Clerk so that your name can be added to the list. We remain convinced that an allotment site is a necessary part of a village like ours, especially because more houses are on smaller plots and there is increasing anxiety about the security of food supplies and about the provenance of food.

Warm Room & Community Pantry

For the last 16 weeks the parish council, with the support of an amazing group of volunteers, has been hosting a weekly Warm Room and Community Pantry. This has been funded by the District Council's ESC Ease the Squeeze initiative and has also been supported by donations by Steve Lomas of Deben Inns.

The Community Pantry was open initially only on Wednesday afternoons and was used very occasionally. We then extended the opening hours to include Tuesday evening but this did not increase the level of take up.

The Warm Room has been well attended by a broad range of residents who have come together on a regular basis to meet and also make, new friends and have a chat over a cup of tea & biscuits. Many people have expressed a hope that a similar weekly get together may be made available during the autumn/winter months which we think is a reflection of its overall success.



It is unclear at the moment whether funding from the District Council will still be available but in any event the parish council, along with the village hall committee, is exploring ways in which we may be able to provide a similar venue for this coming Autumn. We will send out an update when we have some more definite options.

MARTLESHAM HEATH SURGERY – PPG NEWS

Your local pharmacy can provide a wealth of different services, often allowing you the opportunity to seek help & advice without always needing to see a member of the practice team. These services are in addition to the dispensing of prescriptions which is what many people visit the pharmacy for. Many prescriptions are now sent directly to the pharmacy from the surgery, using the Electronic Prescription Service

In addition to dispensing medications, pharmacies can offer services such as:

Prescription and medication advice Emergency contraception

New medicine information Head lice management

Prescription delivery Weight management

Medication reviews Smoking cessation

Contraceptive advice and information Blood pressure testing

Travel vaccines

Many of these services are provided either under the NHS or in some cases some services are available for a fee.

Perhaps you could see what services your usual pharmacy is able to provide. Many pharmacies have a Consultation Room to enable you to talk to the pharmacist in private.

NHS Prescription charges increased to £9.35 per item on 1 April 2023. If you pay for your prescriptions and typically have more than 1 item per month a Pre Payment Certificate (PPC) may be more cost effective. Currently an annual PPC costs £111.60 per year, if you have 2 prescription items a month you would save £120. A 3 monthly PPC is also available for £31.25, again if you have 2 prescription items a month you would save £26 over the 3 months. You can purchase an NHS Prescription Prepayment Certificate either online, search "NHS Prescription Prepayment Certificate" or you can also purchase at some pharmacies.

Since 1 April 2023 a NHS Hormone Replacement Therapy Prescription Prepayment Certificate (HRT PPC) was introduced. This enables you to access HRT medication at a fixed annual price of £19.30, which is the cost of 2 single prescriptions. Again to find out more either go online and search for "NHS Hormone Replacement Therapy Prescription Prepayment Certificate (HRT PPC)" or speak to your pharmacist. It is important to note that if already have the standard PPC it will cover your HRT medication already. So there should be no need to purchase the HRT PPC in addition. However, you can check this using the PPC & HRT PPC websites or by asking your pharmacist.

Since Yahoogroups stopped operating all NW notifications have been sent out via the Waldringfielders googlegroup. Any alerts or information that appear relevant to the very local area will be forwarded via this group asap. Information received and deemed of interest or important to the village will be forwarded to the Waldringfielders googlegroup at the earliest opportunity.

There was a report of tools being stolen from a van in the sailing club car park just before Easter, but unfortunately details were not received until many days after the event and so warnings could not be sent out. I believe the victim also didn't report this to the Police. Greener Waldringfield

Since the last newsletter our main focus has been on forwarding the **Green Infrastructure Workshop** for the parishes of Waldringfield, Newbourne, Hemley,
Martlesham, Kesgrave, Brightwell with Foxhall and Purdis Farm, and Rushmere St
Andrew. This will be facilitated by Prof Peter Hobson, who has run workshops of this kind for Essex County Council, and has been doing a series of talks for the



Woodbridge Climate Action Centre. The date has been confirmed for 30th August and we hope to have the forty stakeholders confirmed in a fortnight – we do know who our Waldringfield ones will be however: Ian Kay and Mariah Balham. The major funding is coming from the Greenprint Forum with support funding from all the participating councils.

We hope the outcome will be a comprehensive and co-ordinated plan to embody the area's Nature Recovery Strategy, which is anyway a statutory obligation for Parishes but much better done at wider scale.



Meanwhile our **fifth Repair Café** on March 4th saw some interesting repairs carried out – the sensitive restoration of old lamps and Scottish darning figured large and several folks got their tools sharpened for the coming season.



The **Food Savvy Workshop** on 16th March focusing on not wasting food, was the first of a series being offered by Suffolk County Council to other parishes. Most food is wasted at the domestic level – a shockingl. slices of bread daily across England, for instance. We also shared tips for what to do with the awkward bits – onion skins make excellent stock powder for instance, if dried and ground!

The most interest was shown in the stall demonstrating air friers large and small, and various other methods of cooking eg slow cookers, microwaves etc. Ovens are by far the most expensive to run!



Waldringfield Swifts

Watch The Skies – They're back. Swifts have been arriving back in the UK and have been seen in Waldringfield and East Suffolk.

You may have noticed that some of our first swifts have arrived back from their winter feeding grounds in Africa. The first two swifts sighted in Waldringfield were reported this year by John Nunn with great excitement. This sighting on the 30th April 2023 is a week earlier than last year with three swifts seen flying high above John's garden and later the same day three were seen in

lower Waldringfield. Other sightings since include high above over Fishpond Rd, School Lane and above the Maybush PH.

Many Waldringfield residents have prepared for their arrival with more swift boxes being installed and call sound systems switched on to call the breeding swifts to potential nest sites. Anticipation is high and the question is will swifts return to the nest boxes they either used or explored last year? It can take time for the juveniles to attune themselves and make use of the wall mounted nest boxes especially if they are in an area where swifts have not made historical use of or not had available the natural nest sites they find under the eaves of roofs or in crooks and crannies of our buildings. As these nest sites become unavailable to swifts due to renovations and modernisation it becomes increasingly important to provide alternatives such as installing swift bricks into the structure of the house build, modifying soffit boards to allow swifts access or to provide wall mounted swift boxes as seen in Waldringfield.

WWG were delighted to be allocated a blue SOS flag from the Suffolk Wildlife Trust/Suffolk Bird group which can be seen on display under the swift boxes at Waldringfield Primary School on the approach into the village. The flag highlights that we in Waldringfield have an active swift group along with other communities in East Suffolk such as Kirton, Felixstowe, Stradbroke, Woodbridge, Melton, Aldeburgh Southwold, Reydon, Halesworth, Framlingham and Wickham Market.

Funding for the flags came from East Suffolk Council Greenprint Forum. A big thankyou to Headteacher Sarah Wood who with parental support arranged display of the flag up on the school building in the absence of a village flag pole to fly it.

But everywhere Swifts are in decline. The swift is currently an Amber List Bird of Conservation Concern although the rate of decline strongly suggests it should be considered as being on the Red List – the highest level of conservation concern. BTO census data indicate recent losses of around 45% of the UK population in just under 20 years (1994 – 2012.) To help and save swifts from extinction please take note of Swift Conservation Guidance: – swift-conservation.org which includes:

- Leave existing nest places un-disturbed;
- If re-roofing make new nest access holes to match the old ones exactly;
- New build: use internal nest spaces are the best using swift bricks;
- If the above cannot be done fit external nest boxes.

Swifts are very neat nesters with little impact on us. Unlike house martins there are no piles of droppings outside and their small nest of feathers and dried plant material is kept neat and tidy.

Your actions can make all the difference. Letting planners know where swifts are nesting can ensure checks are made before roof improvements start or help to justify the need to include purpose build swift bricks or nest boxes in new developments.

If you know where swifts are nesting or have put up swift boxes please let Suffolk Biodiversity Information Service know by logging onto the RSPB swift mapper app: www.swiftmapper.org.uk or www.swiftmapper.org.uk

What To Do if you find a Grounded Swift: Suffolk Wildlife Trust Advise:

- Do not throw the bird up to help it fly, this generally causes injury;
- Put the bird in a quiet, warm safe place away from disturbance. On a tea towel in a ventilated shoe box is excellent;
- Do not attempt to feed the swift;
- Phone your nearest swift carer direct to arrange collection/delivery of the bird.

You can offer the swift a drink by wiping a wet cotton bud around the edge of the bill keeping away from its nostrils.

Lastly enjoy watching our visiting swifts as they herald the arrival of Springand Summer on warm summer evenings. They do not stay for long with many preparing to depart in early August although the later breeders can still be seen until October.

It was a joyful event attended by so many of the community, across all age ranges, coming together on a weekend of special celebrations.



Hedgehog Corner

Hedgehog Awareness Week was April 30th to May 8th but hedgehogs will need our help throughout the year in many ways. Everyone in the parish should have received a hedgehog leaflet or two through their letterbox. *If you did not get one please ask me*. The Hedgehog Preservation Society Trust has been promoting this as they do every year to encourage people to think about how they can help hedgehogs, whose numbers continue to fall. Although badgers have been blamed research has shown that it is mainly loss of habitat which has led to the demise of hedgehogs and other farmland species.

At the excellent Coronation Party in the village hall Nell Sully organised a fun hedgehog quiz for children who enjoyed finding out some interesting facts about hedgehogs, such as that they only eat insects not plants, baby hedgehogs are called 'hoglets' and their spines are made from the same stuff as our fingernails and hair (keratin). Children are encouraged to become hedgehog champions and help hedgehogs in all sorts of ways such as:

Make sure there is access to your neighbouring gardens like a 125mm square or round gap in a fence (helps hedgehogs to roam around the village and find enough food); Put out shallow dishes of water especially in dry weather; Make sure ponds have an easy way to climb out like a beach or a ramp (this helps other creatures too if they fall in); Remove or tidy away anything which might damage or entangle a hedgehog such as loose netting or litter like plastic cups and drinks cans (which hedgehogs can get stuck in)

Lots of other ideas are in the leaflets or see online websites such as www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk Hedgehogs like just the sort of habitat you find under a hedge – weeds, or wild flowers, which provide homes for beetles, snails and slugs which are the hedgehogs' natural food.

Please let us know if you see a hedgehog or the signs of one like hedgehog poo (very black, size of a small earthworm), footprints possibly or spotting one ambling around at night. The wildlife group have a trail camera and a footprint tunnel which can be borrowed by members. Footprint tunnels are easy to make and the instructions can be found online, for example.: https://www.nhm.ac.uk/discover/how-to-make-a-footprint-tunnel.html. By leaving the leaf litter – the ground layer of decayed leaves, twigs and debris from trees on the ground around your garden and not tidying everything away we hope the wildlife which depends on little insects and spiders will return. PLEASE NOTE: Since April 2022 Metaldehyde Slug pellets can no longer be sold or used in the UK. The pesticide called Metaldehyde poses an unacceptable risk to birds, dogs, and wildlife such as hedgehogs.

Hopefully you will see various improvements to the village hall over the coming weeks and months as part of a sustained programme of works over the coming years.

The next phase will involve converting the current lighting to led. This was a recommendation of a recent energy audit. As well as cutting our carbon footprint, it should also reduce our electricity bill and reduce the need to replace light bulbs on a regular basis. We are applying for grant aid but will not know if we are successful for some weeks. Fingers crossed!

Those who are familiar with the village hall will know that we are short of storage space. This means that chairs have to be stored in the Kennedy Room and in the corridor, which is far from ideal. In an attempt to make better use of the space we have available, we have decided to trial having a combined medical room and office and use the old medical room as an additional store. The existing store will then be used purely for the storage of tables and chairs, eliminating the need to store chairs in the corridor.

We have two sheds and one has unfortunately passed its sell by date. We will look to replace it in the next few months. The eagle eyed amongst you may also notice new taps in the toilets!

We are also in the process of building a new website which we hope will be more comprehensive and user friendly.

The ongoing physical improvements may cause an element of disruption but we hope to keep this to an absolute minimum.

The changes are only possible because of your continuing support by using the hall, fundraising and supporting the lottery. This is very much appreciated, as are your ideas and feedback.
